

EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAMS IN CRISIS

The high rate of expulsion in early childhood education is causing harm to children and families. Statistics show:

- More than 300,000 children are expelled each year.
- 50,000 preschoolers are expelled at least once.
- 250 preschoolers are suspended or expelled every day.
- Young boys and girls are at risk for academic failure, absenteeism, and even incarceration.
- Boys are expelled at a rate more than 4.5 times that of girls.
- Black children account for almost 50% of public preschool suspensions but less than one-fifth of all preschoolers.
- Black, brown, Asian Pacific, and children with a disability are more likely to be expelled.

UPDATES FROM OUR PARTNERS

OCCD Scholarships

The Betty Gray Scholarship and Oregon's Family Child Care Scholarship are now under the umbrella of the "Oregon Statewide Scholarship Program." This change is to simplify the process of seeking scholarship support. You can now apply through a single online application, regardless of which funding you are ultimately eligible for.

The new online scholarship application works for all applicants. There are paper applications available in English, Spanish, and Russian.

Introduction to Registered Family Child Care Part 1 and Part 2

Starting October 1, the former Overview for Family Child Care Providers training will be renamed to the Introduction to Registered Family Child Care. This training will consist of two parts and is required by the Office of Child Care in order to become a registered Family Child Care Provider. The required Part One class is available online at http://campus.educadium.com/OCCD/. Part Two is the in-person training you must attend after completing Part One. This free class provides a rule book, resources to help you be successful, information about Child Care Resource and Referral, and more. You must pre-register. Please see page 8 of The Source for more information on how to register for the class.

PORTLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Portland Public Schools will open a Child Care Application process for experienced, high quality, and licensed child care organizations beginning November 4th and closing December 6th. New providers who are accepted through this process will be added to the pool of approved providers. If a child care contract opening occurs in a PPS school for the 2020-2021 school year and beyond, the new provider will be able to compete in the child care selection process. There is no guarantee that the approved provider will be selected. Providers will be notified of the results by February 10th. The application link will be posted on the Portland Public School Child Care Website. For more information, contact Nancy Hauth at nhauth@pps.net or (503) 916-3230.

What is Baby Promise?

Baby Promise is an Oregon publicly funded pilot initiative to increase the retention, supply and quality of infant and toddler care through stabilization of families experiencing low income at or below 185% of the Federal Poverty levels. This program will provide financial assistance to working families to help pay for childcare, improve the quality and safety of childcare and support the supply and availability of childcare for all families.

At this time, the Baby Promise pilot program is accepting applications from child care providers participating in Focused Child Care networks, Community Child Care Initiative (CCI), Preschool Promise, and Early Head Start. Contact Robyn.Harris@mhcc.edu for more information.

REGISTRATION:

 Placement in a requested class will be on a first-come, first-served basis. If there is not space available in the class you request, we will call to let you know.

CANCELLATION POLICY:

Please call ahead of time if you need to cancel. If you cancel at least 24 hours prior to the training for which you are registered, you will be issued a refund. The refund will be issued to the person that was registered for the class, regardless of who paid for the class. Blended CPR classes must be cancelled 2 weeks in advance. See page 9 for specific dates.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

If you miss a class and have not given at least 24 hours notice, you forfeit the payment for the class.

It is important that participants arrive on time and stay for the duration of the class. Participants arriving later than 15 minutes after the start of class will not receive a certificate nor reimbursement, and no partial credit will be issued. In order to receive credit for multiple session trainings, full attendance is mandatory.

The purpose of these sessions is to build on previous knowledge by having professionals use what they have already learned and experienced to think in depth and to learn more. Sessions are developed assuming that participants already have basic knowledge of the subject.

Set Three training presents advanced knowledge. Sessions provide opportunities for analysis, comparison, critical examination, evaluation, research, and/or practical study. Set Three training participants are expected to already have significant and/or intermediate knowledge of and professional experience in the session topic.

The listing for each training session includes age group information:

IT = Infants and toddlers (birth to 3 years old)

PK = Preschoolers (3 to 5 years old)

SA = School-age children (5 to 12 years old)

NA = The class contains no age-related content

CHILD CARE LICENSING INFORMATION

Obtaining a Family Child Care License in Oregon

If you are applying for a Registered Family (RF) license, you will need to attend an Introduction to Registered Family Child Care class (see schedule below). If you are applying for a Certified Family (CF) Child Care license, start by calling the Office of Child Care at 1-800-556-6616. The steps below apply to both types of family child care license.

- Enroll in Oregon's Central Background Registry and follow instructions to complete fingerprinting <u>oregonearlylearning.com</u>
- 2. Complete all Safety Set training (see information below) or make sure certifications are current:
 - · Infant/Child/Adult CPR & First Aid
 - Child Care Food Handler Certification
 - Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse and Neglect (RRCAN) in person or online - certificate does not expire
- Introduction to Child Care Health and Safety (ICCHS) in person or online - certificate does not expire
- Safe Sleep for Oregon's Infants certificate does not expire
- Complete license application and return it to the Office of Child Care

To renew your license, ensure you have a current CPR/First Aid card, a Food Handlers card, and completed all required training hours and submitted certificates to your ORO account as needed.

Introduction to Registered Family Child Care Part Two

The Introduction to Registered Family Child Care is a **free**, two-part class which is required to become a licensed Registered Family (RF) child care provider in Oregon. The mandatory Part One is available online at http://campus.educadium.com/OCCD/. Information presented includes rules and regulations, the application process, child care business principles, and resources including CCR&R services and the USDA food program. 
